

County Lines Policy

Changes made to policy since last issue:

P.1 Para 1, 'exporting' replaced with 'movement of' text change

P.1 Para 1, 'one or more' text removed

P.1 Para 1, 'Children and vulnerable people can also be persuaded, coerced or forced to store drugs and money' text added

P.1 Para 6, 'Designated' text added

P.1 Para 7, 'You will not be asked for your name' replaces 'and they will never ask for your name.'

What does county lines mean?

County lines is a term used to describe gangs and organised criminal networks involved in the movement of illegal drugs out of bigger cities into smaller towns and rural areas using children and vulnerable people, through the use of dedicated mobile phone lines or other form of 'deal line'. The drug runner often needs a place to stay and to do this the gang will take over the home of a vulnerable person, often after following them home. Children and vulnerable people can also be persuaded, coerced or forced to store drugs and money.

How to spot possible victims

There are several signs to look out for when a child or vulnerable adult has been lured into this activity, these include:

- Change in behaviour
- Signs of assault and/or malnutrition
- Access to numerous phones
- Use of unusual terms e.g. going county
- Associating with gangs
- Unexplained bus or train tickets
- School truancy or going missing
- Unexplained gifts (clothes, trainers) and cash

What is Cuckooing?

This is a form of crime in which drug dealers take over the home of a vulnerable person in order to use it as a base for drug dealing.

What are the signs of cuckooing?

Signs that 'cuckooing' may be going on at a property include:

- An increase in people entering and leaving
- An increase in cars or bikes outside
- Possible increase in anti-social behaviour
- Increasing litter outside
- Signs of drugs use
- Lack of healthcare visitors

Child Criminal Exploitation

This is common in county lines and occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, control, manipulate or deceive a child or young person under the age of 18.

What to do if you suspect county lines activity

Contact your Designated Safeguarding Officer and/or **Crimestoppers** anonymously online using a non-traceable online form or by phone.

- Names of individuals involved
- Addresses
- Car registration number of those visiting the premises
- Mobile phone numbers of individuals (if known)
- Types of drugs involved
